AMERICA ON-LINE



Last November, a friend of Addie Mae's was having lunch at Neiman-Marcus' Gazebo in Dallas. For dessert she had a melt-in-your-mouth, delicious cookie, and she asked for the recipe. The waiter told her she could have it, but they would have to charge her two-fifty. She said okay, just charge her account. When she got her bill, they had charged her \$250.00 - this was correct and no error. Since she had to pay it, she wants to be sure and get her money's worth - and pass the recipe on to as many people as possible!

NEIMAN'S \$250 COOKIE RECIPE

(You may cut this recipe in 1/2 and still get 72 cookies)

- 2 cups butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 4 cups flour
- 5 cups blended oatmeal (measure oatmeal and then blend to a fine powder in blender)
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 24-oz chocolate chips
- 1 8-oz hersey bar for baking, grated
- 3 cups chopped pecans

Cream butter and sugars, add eggs. Then add remaining ingredients. Roll into balls and place 2" apart on cookie sheet. Bake for 6 minutes in 3750 oven.
